This year's selection was phenomenal with many unusual and rare pieces.

Friday evening members arrived for the preview and NCC quarterly meeting. Because there were so many pieces of great interest, Lynn Welker's preview was quite lengthy. People were already planning which items would go home with them the next day. The display was wonderful

2005 NCC Benefit Auction Sets New Record for Sales

This year's bidding had a lot of edge-of-the-chair bidding moments. Several bidders had already decided that a particular item was going home with them. The enthusiastic bidding brought the crowd to silence several times during the day. And after the intense bidding came to a conclusion, the audience applauded vigorously for the winner...and for the runner-up. Yes, sadly some people did not get to take home their longed for piece of glass, but this only means that maybe next year there will be an equally treasured item to pique their bidding skills.

During the day more than 390 lots of Cambridge glassware were sold. There was a wide range of colors and patterns this year. There seemed to be something for everyone. Prices ranged from \$5 to \$2350 per piece. New collectors had a good chance to start their collections with some of the bargains that could be had. And the advanced collector had an outstanding selection of rare and unusual items to select from this year. Some noteworthy lots (though there were so many it is hard to decide which to mention) that sold were: a very rare #1574 Crystal large Cornucopia Centerpiece, \$2350; a rare #3400/ 103 Carmen 6-1/2" Globe vase, Japonica decorated and signed, Aero-optic, \$2200; a pair of #1191 Gold Krystol Cherub candlesticks, \$1700; a rare #3011/24 Carmen nude mint dish with Crystal stem

The Glass Pass: Even Better for 2005

The Glass Pass allows visitors to take a journey of artistry and heritage, as they visit the glass museums, factories and gift shops of the Ohio Valley. Created as a joint venture by several glass museums and area visitors' bureaus, The Glass Pass is entering its third season. The National Museum of Cambridge Glass is a charter participant in the project.

Area visitors may pick up a Glass Pass at any of the participating museums, shops and visitors' bureaus in southeast Ohio, western Pennsylvania and northern West Virginia. The Pass offers dicounted admissions to nine local glass-related attractions, including the NCC's museum in Cambridge.

Included this year are: The Baker Family Museum (Caldwell, OH); The Degenhart Museum (Cambridge, OH); The Duncan Miller Museum (Washington, PA); The Fenton Factory and Shops (Williamstown, WV); The Fostoria Museum (Moundsville, WV); The National Heisey Museum (Newark, OH); The National Imperial Glass Museum (Bellaire, OH); The Works (Newark, OH) and the National Museum of Cambridge Glass.

Sponsoring Visitors' Bureaus are: Guernesy County (OH); Belmont County (OH); Greater Licking County (OH); Washington County (OH); Washington County (PA) and Greater Parkersburg (WV).

With Glass Pass in hand, enthusiasts can take the glass journey and discover the rich heritage of America's greatest glassmaking region. In a combination of old and new business, we have started some updating of our Penny Court displays during auction weekend, and we discussed making a Wildflower donation to the Silent Auction at convention. We decided upon an item and brainstormed on various ideas for the silent auction.

Our Program was a time of sharing and discussing things we had purchased at the NCC auction or any recent finds. We had a wonderful Show and Tell, and items included a Peachblo Satin Two Kid flower frog in a Console Bowl with silver rim decoration; an Ebony Ice Bucket with Rockwell Silver early Goose and Pussywillow; a Light Emerald early Draped Lady on oval base; a pressed Rosepoint stem in Amethyst; a Rosepoint etched Vinegar Bottle with "Vinegar" also etched into it; a Light Emerald Ice Bucket etched 704, Pistachio Pencil Dog; Topaz Four Part Relish, etched 732 on the bottom with a Betty border; an Ebony 3 Part Relish; a Carmen Cocktail Shaker with Portia etch; Ebony plainware Comport with Lotus enamel flowers; Ebony Keyhole Vase with Gold Charleton Roses; #1066 Carmen Water Goblet with Brettone etch; small Crystal Soapdish with Diane etch; Carmen Sonata Bowl; a Carmen Ashtray / Cigarette Holder with Matchbook Slot; Royal Blue Globe Vase; and a Milkglass footed Bonbon with Charleton Roses.

Some very interesting additions to our Show and Tell focused on the Deco era, and we looked at and discussed an unusual Ebony ground bottom Crystal Perfume with an Aluminum cover and Bakelite knob top; a pair of American Glass Angelfish Bookends from the late 20's in Amber and Red (never a production item, they were always crystal); a Hickok Bakelite Box with Rifle Tie Clip and Hunting Dog Cufflinks; a Walther (destroyed in Germany in WWII) European Deco satin pink Console Set with white metal Griffin bases; and a Deco "Three Graces" lamp with green Brain globe.

The Wild Side of Cambridge Glass

"Wild Thing, you make my heart sing. You make everything groovy. Wild Thing, I think I love you"

Now, consider a glass collection. Some of the Cambridge glass collectors (and they might be your friends) go so far with their passion that they may even be taking a walk on the 'wild' side of Cambridge. Shall I continue? I dare say your eyes have already scanned this page to find out what is in the article. However, cool down, it is nothing more than a way to have you consider a grouping with a Cambridge theme.

At the recent Benefit Auction, our Crystal Ball Editor asked, once again, for articles to be submitted for publication in the 'skinny' Crystal Ball. He also indicated that the articles do not have to be 'in depth' discussions. Ah-h-h that means this article qualifies......just want you to see that it is easy to put something together. Just a theme...."Wild"......and that's all it took!

Did you see the punch set, in Amber, at the auction? #3200 Near Cut line, Cut Wild Rose. Wonderful!



Having mentioned the Cut Wild Rose, I will begin with that as one of the five items I have to discuss from the 'Wild' side of Cambridge glass. As mentioned, it is a Near Cut pattern and was produced in not only the punch set but also cream and sugars, berry sets, compotes, vases and various bowls. The punch set is known in Amber and Carmen as well as crystal. In an article by Ruth Forsythe (C.B. Issue #2) she discusses the name 'cut wild rose' and how it appears that a rose bud was cut in half lengthwise "exposing the inner beauty of the rose in the pattern." She also said, "We always think of wild rose as a single flower

with five petals." And that brings me to the second of the items found for "Wild."

"Wild Rose" is one of the Named Etchings by Cambridge. According to the *Etchings By Cambridge Volume 1*, the earliest reference found was in a 1929 Trade Publication and the etching can be found on stemware lines #3050, #3051, and #3060. In the picture you can see very clearly the "flower with five petals" as previously mentioned.





The next item using the 'Wild' word is "Wild Ducks" found alphabetically just ahead of Wild Rose in the *Etchings by Cambridge Volume 1*. As a gold encrusted decorate, this etching is known on the #643, 2-piece ash receiver in Ebony. That's it for that...simple enough, now just try to find it!

Next in the 'Wild' category is the wonderful and well-known Cambridge etching, Wildflower. The earliest reference to this etching is 1935. Wildflower was used on the major lines 3400, 3500 Gadroon, 3600 Martha, Pristine and 3900 Corinth. The etching will also appear on many candleholders, tumblers, various relish dishes and a #3650 bell. An entire book is available on the etching Wildflower. The etching is primarily found on crystal, plain or with gold edge, and will appear on some Amber and Gold Krystol pieces. Though elusive, there are some Cambridge examples in Ebony with gold encrusted Wildflower.

The last item I have found is a numbered etching, E517. Collectors often refer to this etching as "Early Wildflower" so I am including it in the 'Wild' category! This etching can be found plain or with a gold encrustation and will be found on relish dishes, the #680 compact and #142 & #152 marmalade.

And there you have it.....everything you ever wanted to know about "The Wild Side of Cambridge." One question, are you humming, "Wild Thing, I think I love you?" Collecting Cambridge glass is a "wild thing' and yeah, I do love it......you make my heart sing!
