# **PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE**

### NCC Members Gather in Florida

Several NCC members gathered the last weekend in January for the Sanlando Depression Glass Show and Sale held in Sanford, FL. Florida hosts three high quality glass shows: Sanford, Clearwater, and Pompano Beach during January and February. With a personal invitation from Fleur de Lys Healy, Greg Vass and I attended our first Sanlando Depression Glass Show in 2011. During my first visit to Sanford, I recall meeting only 4 or 5 fellow NCC members attending the show. Since that time, the number of NCC members making the Sanlando Depression Glass Show and Sale a glass-buying destination has increased significantly. The 2017 show welcomed more than 15 NCC members from North Carolina, Illinois, Ohio, Michigan, Florida, and Washington, DC.

After dinner on Friday evening, Greg and I drove to the Sanford Civic Center for our traditional glass show preview. Possessing two large walls of windows, the Sanford Civic Center offers glass buyers a unique previewing opportunity. From the outside, onlookers can easily view 30% of the glass being offered for sale. During our preview, a few pieces of Cambridge glass caught my attention. On Saturday morning prior to the opening of the show, rumors of unusual pieces of Cambridge glass were circulating. The anticipation built as more and more collectors arrived. When the doors opened at 9:00 am, nearly 100 early buyers scattered throughout the showroom, hustling from booth to booth searching for new additions to their collections.

Twenty-six high quality quality glass dealers set up at this year's show. Every dealer's booth possessed the potential of rare or unusual pieces of Cambridge glass. Some of the most unique pieces of Cambridge glass included a Heatherbloom pillow vase etched Portia, a Light Emerald water pitcher etched Gloria, a Royal Blue nude covered candy, a pink Areo-Optic creamer and sugar etched Cleo, a Gold Krystol Decagon ice bucket etched Diane, a pink water pitcher and decanter etched Imperial Hunt, an Ivory two-kid flower frog, and a Light Emerald pair of dolphin candlesticks with satin finish. Cambridge Everglade collectors, Ron Mandigo and Ray & Paula Mahoney, displayed portions of their Everglade collection for all to enjoy. The display included a broad array of colors (Forest Green, Amber, Willow Blue, Ebony, Carmen, Light Emerald, Pink, crystal, crystal satin, Gold Krystol, and Violet) and shapes with various treatments and decorations. The Sanlando Depression Glass Show and Sale truly possesses something for all glass collectors to enjoy.

Within the next month, you will receive your 2017 Annual Fund and board of director's election materials. At the March board meeting, board members will review the long-term goals for the National Cambridge Collectors and the best methods for achieving them. NCC's mission statement reads,

"The mission of the National Cambridge Collectors, Inc. (NCC) as a non-profit Ohio organization is to inform, invite and inspire people to encourage the continued preservation of, and education about, the handmade glassware produced by The Cambridge Glass Company for future generations through the establishment and maintenance of a permanent museum in Cambridge, Ohio."

Currently, NCC sustains its mission through Annual Fund contributions, the March Auction, gift shop sales, and special gifts. Last year, the Annual Fund generated \$46,055 from 502 households. The break-down of the benefactors is as follows:

- President's Circle (\$1,000) 6
- Japonica (\$500) 14
- Mardi Gras (\$200) 51
- Century Club (\$100) 120
- Patron (\$35) 311

Keys to achieving our mission are: (1) maintaining a strong and active membership, and (2) building a sufficient endowment fund that will support future museum operations. Through engaging membership events, a quality monthly newsletter, membership tables at many glass shows throughout the country, and an inviting museum experience, NCC works continuously to support its current members and recruit future members. To help grow the endowment fund, the board of directors voted to invest the endowment fund which currently stands at \$405,000. As part of our research, the board will seek an expense model projection for future museum operations. With these expense estimates, the board will have a clearer picture of the monies need to successfully endow museum operations. Through your generous gifts, member commitments to the Heritage Society, successful museum operations, various fund-raisers, and market increases, I look forward to the Endowment Fund reaching our goal.

I want to thank everyone who generously supported the 2016 Annual Fund and look forward to your continued support in 2017.

### What's Goes On At The Museum When It's Closed For The Season? By Cindy Arent

Just about every day during January and February volunteers are at the museum cleaning, planning and preparing for the new season. This year we pushed very hard to have some of the new displays at least partially in place for the group of tour operators that arrived at the museum on January 19<sup>th</sup>.

When a group of VIP's is scheduled to visit the museum for a site inspection, pre-planning is the key to a successful visit. Visitors in this group were from Ohio, New Jersey, Georgia, California, New Hampshire and New York. The tour was arranged by the Cambridge /Guernsey County Visitors & Convention Bureau and was held at the conclusion of the American Bus Association Marketplace in Cleveland. You're probably thinking, would these bus companies travel from such a distance to visit the National Museum of Cambridge Glass? This is the reason preplanning for a group of this type is important. They might be planning a cross country tour to a much larger destination and be looking for a good place to stop and visit for a day or two. Museum volunteers were dressed in costume to represent each of our group tour options. Information was shared during their visit and each person received a portfolio containing specific details and contact info.

As part of the new "Time Travelers" program, we have been gathering stories to share during the tour. Hugh McManus made the first piece of Cambridge Glass in May, 1902. Thanks to Mark Nye, we now know where he lived in Cambridge, in addition to stories shared by the McManus family. We also visited Babe Calvert who worked in the etching department painting wax from 1942 until the company closed. Babe is 95 years young and had wonderful stories to share with us. On her first day of work at the glasshouse, a woman by the name of Goldie Bonnell was assigned to teach Babe how to paint the wax. Goldie's daughter, Ethel, worked at Heisey! When asked about the restaurant at the Cambridge Glass Company, Babe said the food was very good.

During January and February, all of the glass was cleaned, over 8,000 pieces! The last showcase was just finished and not one piece was broken or chipped during the process. Work will continue on other projects, displays and museum inventory.

Each year the Cambridge/Guernsey County Visitors & Bureau invites area attractions to work a shift at their booth at the AAA Great Vacations Expo held in Columbus, Ohio. This year we worked the Saturday afternoon shift, dressed as glassworkers, and had a wonderful time sharing information about the museum with many people. Thank you to the VCB for offering this opportunity to promote!

We also received a call from the Ohio History Connection (formerly the Ohio Historical Society) asking NCC to partner with them at a local event sometime this year. We'll keep you posted on this new opportunity.

### 2016 Annual Fund Report

The Board approved the 2016 year-end financial report submitted by our Treasurer Millie Loucks. It was once again a very successful year thanks to the generosity and enthusiasm of our membership.

The Annual Fund achievement was a bit below 2015. We finished the year raising \$46,055, a little over 3% down from last year. The difference can all be explained by the passing of President's Circle member Patty Rutledge. She had been a Circle member in 2015. NCC was blessed that her estate remembered us in her will and we received an over \$60 thousand bequest. Those funds have largely been used to reduce our debt on the Yellow and Brick buildings from \$100 thousand to \$40 thousand.

The Board and all of our Committee Chairs greatly appreciate the generosity you provide. It helps fund the many initiatives that keep NCC vibrant and continuing to run a World Class Museum.

The number of benefactors (\$100 level or above) rose in 2016 from 2015 (189 to 191). That is over 38% of participating households. We had 311 patrons (\$35 level) for a total of 502 households. This represents 41 states and the District of Columbia as well as Canada.

We are again publishing the list of Benefactors in this issue of the Crystal Ball. Please check over the Benefactor List carefully. 

Wouldn't it be great if we could get an in-person, handson tutorial on how best to use this magnificent resource?

Well now you can. Please come our 2017 NCC Convention, you can join MVSG on a **Digital Safari** and greatly expand your facility for how to do successful searches – thereby solving problems, answering questions and becoming smarter on Cambridge Glass.

I asked NCC's VP of Education (and Miami Valley Study Group member) Larry Everett to give us a snapshot of this program ...

The analogy would be the difference in going on a safari looking for "big game" with or without an experienced guide. Participants are encouraged to bring their electronic devices and actively join the search for animals as we guide them to the most promising areas.

We are still sorting out the exact Convention schedule, but our Digital Safari is currently set to embark on Thursday afternoon June  $22^{nd}$  at 4 pm. Make sure to bring your iPads or laptops. It will be held at Pritchard Laughlin and will be followed by our Thursday Salute Cocktail Party.

In other Convention news:

- Contracts are out to dealers for the 2017 Glass Show and Sale. We are expecting another robust show with high quality glass dealers from around the country. As I travel the country, the buzz about our 2016 show has been incredible and we have more dealers who are asking to be part of the fun. We will keep making it better and better.

- Convention registration will be in the April Crystal Ball and again we are looking at electronic registration that we know will be even smoother in Year II.



### **From The Archives**

In the 1932 supplement to the 1930 Cambridge Glass Company catalog one page was captioned Console Sets. Two No. 1307 three light candelabra were paired with various console bowls decorated with both cuttings and etchings. A circular letter, dated January 12, 1932, dealt with three of these sets, in particular those decorated with Chintz etchings: Etch No. 758, aka Chintz No. 1; Etch No. 759, aka Chintz No. 2; and Etch No. 766, aka Rose Chintz. This circular letter follows.

This column features Cambridge glass items that sold on eBay circa January through early February. 2017 began with a *serious* dearth of notable Cambridge glass being offered and sold on eBay. However, as press time approached, I noticed that some very nice items had been listed. Whew! If they hadn't, Mr. Verbose here would have had to give you a one-page column this time. Selling prices have been rounded to the nearest dollar, and if no color is mentioned, assume it is crystal. Here we go:

#### Statuesque (Nude Stem) Line

A cocktail with late-era Pink bowl sold for \$50 on a Buy It Now. The seller offered two of them, in separate auctions. Another seller has been offering one at a price that is \$300 over that sale price. Good luck with that. A tall cocktail with Smoke bowl sold for \$103. Using

this glass would enable one to both "Smoke" and drink at the same time, now wouldn't it?

A flared comport etched Gloria sold for a glorious \$287.



Animals and Figural items



A Melon Boy flower figure in Peach Blo was offered for a \$500 Buy It Now or Best Offer, and sold for an undisclosed best offer.

A Peach Blo Rose Lady flower holder on the early tall style base brought \$259. Prices on Cambridge figural flower frogs in the more oft-seen shapes and colors

have been soft for quite some time, which puzzles me. Sure, the 8-1/2 inch Draped Lady in Crystal, Light Emerald, Peach Blo, or Amber is common, but these are gorgeous pieces that appeal to people who aren't even Cambridge glass collectors. I think we need to start a campaign to buy these and give them as gifts to people who haven't discovered the joy of Cambridge glass yet. (Of

#### Rose Point Etched Dinnerware and Tableware



Yikes! A#1536 peg nappy etched Rose Point brought \$257.

A set of 7 #3400/56 5-1/2 inch fruit saucers (that's the company

by the way) etched Rose Point brought \$371. That's 53 bucks apiece! The sale price is a testament to how hard these are to find



A #7801 12 ounce footed ice tea tumbler etched Rose Point brought \$41. This shoulda-woulda-coulda brought more, but given how scarce this late shape is, only the most diligent collector would try to put together a set of Rose Point tumblers in this line. Interestingly, this tumbler is shown on the same catalog page as the next item ....



A rare #119 83 ounce pitcher etched Rose Point was offered with an opening bid of \$200. I thought it might go over with a yawn, as it sat with no bids for six days before someone placed the opening bid. The vultures waited until a couple hours before closing to bid it up. In the last few minutes, a flurry of bidding

brought it up to the winning bid of \$490. I reported on one of these in my September, 2016 column, which sold for \$425. It's good to know that key pieces of Rose Point can still command a hefty price.

### Other Etched Stemware and Tableware

A #170 syrup with metal slide-on top and a matching etched underplate in Peach Blo, etched Cleo, was offered at \$395. It sold for an undisclosed Best Offer price.





A #1408 60 ounce cocktail churn etched Diane was offered for \$500 or Best Offer, and sold for an undisclosed best offer. The sterling silver churn was missing, or it might have brought more. Did I ever mention the time I saw one of those churns at an antique show, *sans* cocktail pitcher, and the dealer had it labeled as a "hat stand"? As Forrest Gump said, "Stupid is as stupid does."

### Miscellaneous

A set of 5 pressed stem Rose Point cocktails with Carmen bowls sold for \$81. That's 15 bucks apiece. I guess I'm going to be harping on the soft market for this line until at least two people decide it's the cat's meow and start competing to vacuum it all up.

Despite my statement above, one pressed stem Rose Point offering did well. A set of three short stems with Amethyst bowls sold for an impressive \$195 on a Buy It Now. The seller offered them



as oyster cocktails (understandable, given their shape and size), but Cambridge did not offer that size stem in this line; they are actually juice tumblers.

One seller offered two prism style Cambridge Glass dealer signs. The Peach Blo brought \$168, while the Emerald Green one commanded \$171.



A #3400/121 cocktail shaker in solid Forest Green (which looked like the darker shade of that color from the late period) brought \$160 on a Buy It Now. The chrome lid appeared to be in immaculate condition.

A pair of #3 or #1211 Everglade 2-light candleabra in Carmen brought a too-low \$103, perhaps due to a poor photograph that made the red color look very strange. It was noted that one had shallow chips to the tip of both lower long leaves.

A Sea Shell line #34 10" 3-footed bowl in very-seldom-seen-forthis-line Royal Blue brought \$200.



A grouping of three Caprice cordials with crystal stems, each with a colored bowl (Pistachio, late period Pink, and Mocha) sold for an impressive \$390. How did I not realize that Cambridge made "Harlequin" or "Duo Tone"-type cordial sets in Caprice??



A #277 9 inch footed vase in Ebony with gold encrusted Wildflower etching bloomed in darkness at \$242.

A 14-piece luncheon set in Pistachio Caprice sold for \$295. (For the new collector, a luncheon or bridge set generally consists of 4 plates, 4 cups and saucers, and

a cream and sugar.)

Now HERE's something you don't see for sale very often: a

set of six Simplicity line footed tumblers in the Blue Cloud treatment (random flecks of what look like Windsor Blue opaque glass swirling in a crystal base glass.) These rare examples of a Cambridge line that

was introduced during the reopening period (post-1955) sold for





\$271. A similar line called White Rain (self-explanatory) was also made during that time. The same seller offered a set of six sherbets to match, which brought \$163.50.



This month's Cambridge high-bid standout was a #3121 water goblet. The seller incorrectly labeled it as 3122. Offered at \$799, it was reduced to \$599, and sold for either that price or an undisclosed best offer. So, what was it, solid gold or something? No, this experimental item had what the seller described as a "fire orange" stem with a crystal bowl and foot.

All I can say is, I hope our Museum was the purchaser.

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

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
