New this year to start off our evening, we will have Happy Hour Glass Dash for your shopping pleasure. From 5:00 to 5:45 during happy hour, attendees can bring glass to sell. From happy hour we move to the banquet and a short business meeting. See menu below. The popular Show N Tell is next, then it's on to the main program.

This year, Mike Strebler and Jack Thompson will present Rock Crystal Engravings. Also referred to as cuttings, this should be a very interesting program. Many Cambridge collectors are not aware of the scope and breadth of what Cambridge produced. Learn how cuttings were done and who did them.

We start with the early era of the company, and next progress through the 1920s where gray cuttings were done on transparent colors. Then it's on to the explosion of polished cuttings on crystal of the 1930s into the 1940s. The program concludes with the period of the 1950s that included the reintroduction of cuttings on color blanks. Mike & Jack presented this program last

Emma Stratton, our 2022 summer intern, stopped by to help with a project.




NCC members, Doug and Linda Warren from South Carolina, visited the Museum in August. They even did a little shopping in the back room.

2024 NCC AUCTION CONSIGNMENT PROCEDURES

The date of the 2024 NCC Auction will be March 16, 2024 and will be held once again at the Pritchard Laughlin Civic Center in Cambridge Ohio.

The due date for the Consignor lists will be September 15, 2023 to give us time to choose the items and get your

list back to you. Some folks like to bring their glass to the Fall membership meeting which will be Saturday October 21st, 2023. If you cannot make it to the Fall membership meeting, there will be mailing instructions with your selection of the glass for the auction.

Please try to follow the format below to make our job a little easier. Submit your list in Excel or Word document (preferably Excel). An example of how you should describe an item:

2. The Auction Committee will make final selections and notify consignors by Saturday September 30, 2023 (or sooner). We select approximately 400 pieces of glass. If you question why certain pieces are not chosen, it does not mean that they are undesirable; and we encourage you to submit them again another year. It can mean different things: we already have chosen a similar piece from another consignor, or we can only accept a certain number of pieces from each consignor to be fair to all.

3. Consignors will either mail or bring their glass to the fall meeting on Saturday October 21, 2023. Those who will not be attending the fall meeting, will have approximately 3 weeks to mail their items.

Reason NOT MAIL Lists or Glass TO THE MUSEUM. The address for shipping your glass will be included in your acceptance Letter.

For those consignors able to bring their glass with them while attending the fall meeting, you save on shipping charges, avoid potential breakage in transit, and, best of all, you get to attend a great NCC function including an excellent dinner and program accompany the meeting. In the event that we accept an item based on the consignment list, and it is determined <u>not</u> to be Cambridge glass, we will hold it for pickup by the consignor or have it mailed once they send us the return shipping charge.

- 5. A few pointers on the glass you are submitting.
 - Please, CLEAN glass only it sells so much better when it is CLEAN. If we have to clean your glass, the chances of the item getting damaged is greater and we will not be responsible if it is damaged.
 - Make sure any previous price stickers or glue from stickers is removed. There are great products on the market to remove the stickers.

This is a benefit auction for your favorite club, and we want to realize as much profit as possible. On all consignments, NCC retains 20% of the purchase price, the consignor receives 80%. This auction does not allow for reserves or minimum prices. There are no buyer's premiums charged. Let's help make the 2024 NCC Benefit Auction successful. **Donations are welcomed and ENCOURAGED as** well, and 100% of the purchase price goes to NCC. Some lower-value donated pieces may be sold in the museum's gift shop rather than be included in the auction, if the committee feels that will yield a better price.

The committee needs to strictly adhere to all dates mentioned as we only have a few short weeks to properly inspect, identify and have a completed auction catalog sent to the Crystal Ball editor, so that it can be included in the January issue and posted on the NCC website. We would like to thank all consignors in advance for their timeliness in each step of the procedures.

National Cambridge Collectors, Inc. Minutes of the June 23, 2023 Annual Meeting

President Freeman Moore called the meeting called to order at 7:13 pm, with approximately 175 members attending in person at the Pritchard Laughlin Civic Center and virtual.

Freeman welcomed all first timers and those who have come to every convention since inception including Frank and Vicki Wollenhaupt and Joy McFadden. Freeman informed attendees that the programs at the convention will be recorded for later viewing. Stu Sandler was introduced as the newest Board member, filling the vacancy caused by the death of David Rankin. Thank you Stu for accepting the position.

Secretary report – Christine Smith

The November member meeting minutes were published in the May2023 Crytal Ball. Larry Everett made a motion to waive the reading of the minutes and approve the minutes as published. Scott Adams seconded the motion. Voice vote: All yeas. No nays. No abstains.

Treasurer Report - Mike Strebler

Deferred to the finance committee.

Committee Reports

Endowment Committee - Doug Ingraham

Doug reported the current balance is nearly \$1M. In 2015, it was about \$250,000. Merrill Lynch is the fund manager. The Endowment fund has increased due to investment gains, fund transfers from operations, member donations and NCC events. Additional funds will be added due to the 50/50 raffle and sale of Scotty dog bookends at convention. Thank you to all the members that helped build this fund which will sustain NCC in the future.

Finance Committee - Mike Strebler

Thank you to the finance committee for their hard work. Members include Mike Strebler as chair, Larry Everett, Freeman Moore, Helen Klemko, Dave Rankin, Ken Filipini, Milli Loucks, Doug Ingraham, and Lynn Welker. Finance committee reports a projected \$45,000 surplus by the end of the 2023. NCC is donor funded with the Annual fund used to support of the organization. This year, we have been able to transfer \$50,000 from the general fund to the Endowment Fund. Mike also reported on behalf of the glass show committee. Thank you to glass show committee including Elaine Thompson, Lisa Strebler, Mike Strebler, Jack Thompson, and David Ray. Friends of Steve Klemko sponsored the show. They also gave a gift for the museum consisting of a Cambridge decanter commemorating Henry VIII with silk screen. A beautiful addition! Thank you!

Property Committee - Larry Everett

NCC owns both the yellow house and the brick building next to the museum. We use the yellow house as a staging place for the auction and for storage of auction glass and other glass. Brick building is currently being used as a rental property and earns approximately \$12,000 per year.

Membership committee - Elaine Thompson

This committee was formed in May 2022 and includes Freeman Moore, Ken Filipini, Jane Filipini, Christine Smith, Elaine Thompson, and Lisa Strebler. The purpose of the committee is to retain and recruit members. Over the past year, the committee has 1) administered a member survey last year, 2) sent hand-written notes to all new members and to those who did not renew in 2022, 3) information was also sent to anyone who marked on the glass show cards that they were interested in more information about NCC. The committee is expanding the mentor program and is in need volunteer mentors. Let the committee know if you would like to be a mentor or help in some other capacity.

Operational VP Reports

Administration - Larry Everett

Larry thanked Lisa Nielson for her work as NCC Business Manager!

Larry also reported that the NCC website will be redesigned by Don Smith Designs. This company will begin work on this activity in early July.

Development - Julie Buffenbarger

Julie reported on the 2023 Convention and thanked the convention committee, Christine Smith, Stu Sandler, David Ray, Tim Crose, and Nancy Crose. The committee met frequently to plan and prepare for the event. Great job to Julie on a well-planned convention! Let Julie know if you are interested in joining the 2024 committee. We can always use your ideas and help to have a successful convention.

Education – Jack Thompson

Crystal Ball: Thank you, Freeman as editor and to all those past editors for their hard work! The eBay reporter is currently Michael Krumme but he will be unable to do continue and a replacement is needed. Please see Jack Thompson if you are interested. The Crystal Ball continues to evolve. Currently adding tidbits and reprinting historical meeting minutes. Jack is also revising and creating color charts.

Fall quarterly meeting: Last fall, the meeting featured Everglade. Jack will be announcing this Fall's meeting topic soon. It will be October 21 at Theo's Restaurant.

Larry Everett presented about the NCC Media position. The Media position was held by David Rankin. He created with Larry the Cambridge glass data base and library. He was a digital archivist and director of research. His legacy was in research. Dave and Larry scanned trade publications, researched and then published in finding in the Crystal Ball. He led the way to the website development. All of this information was made available digitally. The website, Mvsg.org is now Cambridgeglassdatabase.org. David did all of this because he was doing what he loved and did this at no cost to NCC. He will be missed!

Member Services – Freeman Moore

Freeman reported our membership numbers: Honorary 1, Lifetime 10, Patron 298, Century 185, Japonica 21, Junior Member 9, Mardi Gras 106 and President's Circle 29. This year's total is 659 compared with 668 this time last year. Museum - Cindy Arent

Cindy began her report with an introduction of the descendants of Arthur Bennet and Bill Orme who were present at dinner.

It seems that the museum is busy year-round. Every winter the museum is thoroughly cleaned. Inventory is checked and displays are rotated. This year caulking on windows was redone and cracks on sidewalk repaired. The sidewalk was repaired rather than replaced because there are heating coils on the sidewalk, making too expensive to replace. Thank you to Jeff Ross for going up to the roof and cleaning the leaves away from the drains.

This year, our new displays include the worker restaurant display with push button technology and the WW II scrap drive exhibit.

Museum marketing – grants received for marketing including a TV commercial. Thank you to Jonathan Furman for Facebook posts and boosts. The Museum website has also been updated. The Cambridge area Chamber of Commerce presented the museum with the 50 years in business award for NCC. For the past 18 years, the museum has sponsored a "glass blower at work" scene as part of the Dickens Victorian Village.

Thank you for all your glass donations and to all the members for their support of the museum.

Unfinished/Old Business:

This year's nominating committee consisted of Nancy Finley, Elaine Thompson (chair), and Freeman Moore. The membership approved the slate of 4 candidates at the March membership meeting. Zoom & Tell: Jugs, Pitchers and Tankards

Throughout its years of operation, the Cambridge Glass Company used the terms jug, pitcher, and tankard. Each of these three terms describe what most collectors call a pitcher. There are no easy guidelines to distinguish between the three terms, so in this article, I will refer to everything as a pitcher. Les Hansen led the July Zoom & Tell program and shared that "jug" is the term the English use when referring to a pitcher. With Mr. Bennett immigrating from England, this likely explains why Cambridge chose the term "jug" over the American term "pitcher".

From the opening of the factory, Cambridge produced many different styles of pitchers with various capacities for various uses. Here are a few examples of pitchers produced during the Near Cut era.







During the 1920's, Cambridge introduced a variety of new colors and etchings. Many unique designs, which included pitchers with lids, were produced in the colors of the 1920's and were often decorated with etchings. Staring in the early 1930's, Cambridge introduced their iconic 3400 ball jug and Doulton jug. These two jugs were extremely popular with the buying public, as well as many glass decorating companies. Several guests of the July Zoom & Tell program shared unique examples from their collections. No matter what pattern, color, or decoration you collect, Cambridge produced a variety of pitchers to fit your collecting interests. Here are a few examples shared during the program.



On Tuesday, September 12, Mike and Lisa Strebler will lead the Zoom & Tell program on Cambridge baskets. Cambridge produced baskets in various sizes, colors, and styles. NCC Crystal Ball



Cambridge Curiosities

By Jack Thompson Chapter 11



Welcome to some of my whimsical observations of the wonderful world of Cambridge glass. Over time, we have come to realize there are so many interesting, strange and/or quirky things about this company and the beautiful products they made. Some may never be explained, but all are just plain fun to think about.

In my very first column, I mentioned how I think shrimp icers are just plain cool. Originally introduced in the '27-29 catalog in the Decagon Line, the #968 also had a Decagon liner. This continued only through the 1930 catalog. When the '32 catalog supplement came along, as the Decagon Line was phased out, the Decagon liner was replaced with the more traditional one most often seen today. The Decagon liner was thicker and heavier, so was probably more expensive to produce. It is also much more difficult to find. To be accurate, Cambridge originally called them a 2-Piece Seafood or Fruit Cocktail. Later they changed the name to a 2-Piece Cocktail Icer. Most will be optic, but not always, particularly when cut. Other companies also produced the liners, and some seem to resemble Cambridge's later version. Most collectors don't seem to mind though.

Liners

When we first started collecting Cambridge glass, one of our early lessons was how to measure pieces for identification purposes. Circular items were measured by its diameter. Noncircular items such as oval trays and bowls were measured by the largest width, etc. Comports were measured by their width, not their height. This one still gets me when you see something labeled a 6" Tall Comport. It's a tall comport that is 6"

wide, not 6" tall. Some things are intuitive, while others



For this column, I want to focus on pieces with handles: bowls, plates and trays in particular. Cambridge almost always measured these items without the handles. For example, Cambridge identified the #3500/64 Relish as 10", measured without the handles. It measures 12" with the handles. The #3400/1186 plate is identified as 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ ". It measures 16" with the handles. Then came the #3900 line.



not so much. NCC Crystal Ball

The #3900 or Corinth Line was introduced in the mid-1940s and makes its big appearance in the 1949 catalog. It was not a very extensive line compared to earlier ones. It was a product of the times, as the company was experiencing declining sales and changing consumer tastes. A popular

conjecture is that marketing must have wanted to utilize every tool they could to promote Cambridge glass. So they decided to include the handles in the measurement of the pieces to make it seem like the customer was getting a larger piece of glass. Whatever the reason, this has caused great confusion over the years with collectors. Granted, these are all handmade pieces of glass, and variations of $\frac{1}{4}$ " - $\frac{1}{2}$ " is not uncommon. However, out of 10 measured pieces in the #3900 line with handles, Cambridge included the handles in the measurement of 8. This inconsistency within the line itself adds even more to the confusion.

In the #3900 line, there are 3 bowls, 4 relishes, 2 plates and a bonbon that come with handles. Items in blue, Cambridge included the handles in the measurement; items in green, they did not.

Cascade was another line introduced at about the same time as the #3900 line and appears for the first time right after it in the 1949 catalog. I thought they must have also made the same decision with it. There are two Cascade pieces that have handles (ice tub and cream & sugar don't count) that might come into play with the measurement. The #4000/130 – 7" 2-Hdl. Ftd. Bonbon and the #4000/131 - 8" 2-Hdl. Ftd. Bonbon Plate both are measured without the handles. So that leaves the #3900 line as the only one I can come up with that used the handles in the measurement.

There are a couple of "sort of" exceptions. The #3500/97, 99 & 100 Trays are measured with the handles, although the handles are more inset as part of the piece. Are there other examples that you know of in the Cambridge line? Please let me know so I can share.



Welcome to the eBay Report, featuring Cambridge glass items that sold on eBay over the past month. Selling prices are rounded to the nearest dollar. If no color is mentioned, assume that the piece or part of it being discussed is crystal. If I refer to an auction as "incognito," that means that the seller did not know he or she was offering Cambridge glass, and didn't use the word "Cambridge" in the description. I also mention if a listing was a Buy It Now offering, as opposed to an auction style listing. I think it's important to distinguish between the two, as the price for an auctioned item reflects competitive bidding (or no competition, if it sells

for the opening bid.) Here we go:

A 3400/38 tilt jug in Royal Blue with sterling overlay with minor base wear sold for 357.50. This is the 80 ounce size and was listed at 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 8" wide. The patent date was embossed on the bottom.



Two #6 Azurite 6 1/4" bowls with a gold encrusted Egyptian etch were listed in two separate sales 8 days apart by the same dealer and both sold at the opening bid



of \$29.99. Perhaps this was a case of the first bidder not completing the bid or maybe the seller had two to sell? A pair of these Art Deco bowls would be nice to have.

A beautiful ebony 4 part handled server #3400/862 with silver overlay was sold at the Buy it Now price of \$59.99.

A gorgeous 3400/92 32 oz decanter in Royal Blue with Hunt Scene & 6 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz shot tumblers with "Just A

Swallow" silver overlay by National Silver Deposit sold for a \$429.99 Buy It Now.



A 3500/14 covered urn etched and gold encrusted Minerva noted as rare and minty was listed at \$475.00 and sold for an undisclosed Best Offer.



A rare 9 3/4" candy and cover in ivory etched Willow with blue enamel encrusted and decorated in gold, with an original



22k gold paper label on the bottom sold at the high bid of \$256.99 with 23 bids. It is either #95 $\frac{1}{2}$ pound candy or #96 1 pound candy. Dimensions are not available to determine which size. Wear to the gold was noted.


