# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

# A New Year!

The auction team with help from volunteers, selected, identified, photographed, and cataloged 405 lots for the March Auction. Many beautiful pieces of Cambridge glass are being offered for sale, and I anticipate fierce bidding on several items. The pictures are good, but seeing all that sparkling glass on display is a sight you need to experience.

My wife Jeannie and I separately review the listing and photographs of each item. We then talk over the differences between our two lists. Sometimes one of us saw a unique decoration, or maybe a piece to complement our collection. After studying the auction listing, the number of items we have highlighted on the auction catalog will likely far exceed our budget. Although we have collected Cambridge glass for more than 30 years, we are amazed by the beauty and variety of the glassware produced by the Cambridge Glass Company. Sometimes, we agree upon bidding on an item. Other times, we agree that we just need to see the item in person to appreciate it. Narrowing the number of items on which to bid can be difficult.

This year's auction has items to tempt every collector. You'll find pieces with gold encrusted etching, gold trimmed, enamel decorated, and Charleton decorated. If you are looking for a particular statuesque stemware item, you'll find a nice assortment. If you are a cordial collector, you have some nice ones to select from. And of course, the selection of colors available is outstanding.

It is always impressive to see some rare or unusual items in the auction, even if they don't make it into your collection. Check out lot #209 Turquoise 9 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>" Crucifix Candlestick; lot #253 3-part Amber Candy, GE Wildflower; look at several lots of Decalware items; lot #367 is a Nearcut Radium 8" Bowl with an unusual shape; if you are remodeling and need door knobs, you should consider lots #203 and 204. You'll find a variety of etchings for you to add to your collection. Browse

through the auction listing and pictures and make your own selections.

If you are unable to attend the March auction in person, make sure to submit your absentee bids as described in the January issue.

### Social Media

How does NCC engage with collectors on social media? Facebook is the most popular site. Cindy Arent shares information about the latest happenings at the museum. Over 3,000 people like and follow the museum Facebook page. Obviously, Cindy is engaging with a lot of interested people, but who are not members of NCC. # 2023 – We'll Be Ready!

Each year in January, first the holiday displays need to be packed away before the winter cleaning can begin. We start in the Museum Education Center to get warmed up. Before any of the showcases can be cleaned, the walls and woodwork need to be done. We then work our way through cleaning over 8,000 pieces of glass and sometimes we have unexpected visitors. Yesterday, two detectives from the Cambridge Police Department knocked on the door and asked to see our camera footage. We are always cooperative.

Did you know that we have two ongoing fundraising projects totally funded by members? They are the Cambridge Ornaments and Jewelry. Carl Beynon began making the jewelry many years ago and now Susan Everett has taken on the job. The ornament tools and decorations are funded by Lindy Thaxton and myself. Frank Wollenhaupt grinds the edges of the bowls with minor damage. In 2022, the jewelry raised \$1,575 and the ornaments \$4,070.

Some Museum maintenance projects are scheduled to begin this winter. First on the list will be the removal of an old dishwasher left over from when the Ohio Power Company owned the building. Museum exterior projects will begin when warmer weather arrives.

There are also new displays on the schedule for 2023. Details will be announced in the March issue. However, did you know that The Cambridge Glass Company had its own restaurant and the pie was delicious? Or how the company supported the World War II scrap drive?

The Cambridge/Guernsey County Visitors & Convention Bureau (VCB) has set aside funds again this year for the marketing of events which exhibit positive tourism potential. These funds are to assist qualified applicant organizations with the advertising and promotion of activities which directly increase lodging occupancy in designated periods throughout the year, create positive image building publicity for the Cambridge/ Guernsey County area, and enhance the tourism environment. A grant for 2023 will be submitted to the Cambridge/ Guernsey County Visitors & Convention Bureau through their Grant Assistance Program. Grants are available for non-profit organizations and the recipients will be announced in late March.

The Museum's Facebook page continues to grow. Photos and updates on the winter cleaning process have been shared and I will continue to post. It's nice to see member's names who like the post or comment. Thank you for your support!

Start planning now to attend the 2023 March Auction. The Museum will be open Friday, March 17 from 10 a.m. – 4 p.m. and Saturday, March 18 from 2 p.m. – 5 p.m. ■







Minutes of the October 8, 2022 Quarterly Meeting

The Fall Membership Meeting was called to order by Freeman Moore at 6:37 pm at Theo's Restaurant in Cambridge Ohio, with about 40 members in attendance.

#### Secretary's Report:

Christine Smith reported that the minutes of the June Annual Meeting were published in September 2022 Crystal Ball. Larry Everett made a motion to approve the minutes as printed. Frank Wollenhaupt seconded the motion. All yeas. No nays. No abstain.

#### **Treasurer's Report:**

Mike Strebler reported that NCC finances are running close to budget and no issues are foreseen.

#### **Operational VPs' Status Reports**

#### Administration – Larry Everett

Larry reported a new computer has been installed at the museum to replace the previous one which had hardware problems.

#### Development – Julie Buffenbarger

Lynn Welker reported the 2023 Auction is scheduled for March 18 at the Prichard Laughlin Civic Center. There will be a membership meeting the Friday evening before, followed by a preview of the auction. The team is currently working on cataloging items. Most items have arrived and thanks to everyone for helping.

NCC could use help with applying for grants. Contact Julie if you might be interested.

#### **Education – Jack Thompson**

Jack Thompson gave a hearty "Thank You" to everyone who attended tonight's meeting. He also mentioned that next year's Fall meeting will be Saturday Oct 21 2023, and Theo's Restaurant has been reserved. Suggestions for the meeting's program are appreciated.

Jack also reported about two member presentations. Frank Wollenhaupt presented at Vaseline Glass Collectors 2022 Convention. Attendees were amazed to learn about all the Cambridge glass that is considered vaseline. Jack Thompson and Mike Strebler gave a presentation at Michigan Depression Glass Society on Cambridge cuttings.

#### **Member Services – Freeman Moore**

Freeman Moore reported we currently have 685 members, and reminded everyone to help recruit new members, sharing information wherever appropriate.

Members support NCC through the Annual Fund process which started in April, and that a few members need a 3<sup>rd</sup> reminder mailing that has been sent out.

The NCC board approved the formation of a new membership committee to work on recruitment and retainment. Elaine

Thompson is the chair. The committee created the survey that was sent out to members in June. The results have been reviewed by the board and by the committee. The committee and the board are working on initiatives based on the survey results.

#### Museum – Cindy Arent

Cindy Arent reported the Museum will be open Friday and Saturdays and for motor coaches for the remainder of the year. The dining room will be decorated with gold encrusted Carmen in conjunction with NCC 50th anniversary.

Ornaments are being sold in the gift shop. 49 ornaments have sold already. Cindy thanked the members for their support of the museum. Members and non-members have been responding to postings on Facebook about museum activities.

Motor coaches have been coming into the museum for tours. There are 20 groups scheduled between now and the end of the year. Volunteers would be appreciated to help handle the visitor traffic.

#### Old business:

At the June meeting, the motion to increase the size of the board of directors from 12 to 15 was tabled until June 2023. Freeman asked if any members would like to discuss this motion. No discussion was requested.

#### New Business:

Jack Thompson asked if anything was being planned for the NCC 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary year. Freeman responded the Convention will recognize the milestone as discussions are being held by Convention committee. Jack Thompson suggested activities throughout the year to celebrate this milestone. Freeman Moore reported members will see information starting in the March Crystal Ball. The board will also discuss and follow through.

Larry Everett reported on updates to the digital library, <u>https://</u> <u>cambridgeglasslibrary.com/</u> and encourages members to check it out. Catalogs, Crystal Ball, and price lists are located here. This is open to anyone (members and public) and they can search by subject or key words. The library will highlight the search results on the identified pages. The current activity is scanning and adding Turn Cards to the library.

With no further new business to discuss, Jeannie Moore made a motion to adjourn the meeting. The motion was seconded by Elaine Thompson. All yeas. No nays. No abstains.

Meeting adjourned at 7:11 pm.

# Crystal Ball Table of Contents

# January 2020 thru December 2022

In 1979, an index to the first 68 issues of the Cambridge Crystal Ball, compiled by Luene B. Brandt, was published for current members of the National Cambridge Collectors, Inc.

A follow up to that index was published in 1992. It provided a table of contents covering January 1979 – June 1992. Another update was published in August 2016 covering July 1992 to December 2002.

Another follow-up was published in February 2020. It provided a table of contents covering January 2003 - December 2019. This update covers the years 2020-2022, making for a shorter index. While not an index in the research nomenclature, it provides, in chronological order, a listing of articles dealing with all aspects of the Cambridge Glass Co. published in the Cambridge Crystal Ball newsletter Articles dealing with club functions, presidential messages, and monthly articles are not included.

For each article, the issue date, issue number, the subject or title of the article and the author's last name is provided. Full names of the authors are provided at the end. No attempt was made to list multiple topics covered in some articles; for example, articles on colors, vases, etc., or when more than one color of item was discussed in article.



This eBay Report is provided to keep members up with what's happening on the world's largest Internet Auction site, and focuses on Cambridge glass items that are seldom or rarely seen. Please note we cannot guarantee the accuracy of listings herein.

Welcome to the eBay Report, featuring Cambridge glass items that sold on eBay circa mid- December 2022 through mid-January 2023. Selling prices are rounded to the nearest dollar. If no color is mentioned, assume that the piece or part of it being discussed is crystal. If I refer to an auction as "incognito," that means that the seller did not know he or she was offering Cambridge glass, and didn't use the word "Cambridge" in the description. I also mention if a listing was a Buy It Now offering, as opposed to an auction style listing. I think it's important to distinguish between the two, as the price for an auctioned item reflects competitive bidding (or no competition, if it sells for the opening bid.) Here we go:

#### Statuesque (Nude Stem) and Related Items

Back in November, I missed that a brandy with optic bowl in Heatherbloom sold for \$75 Buy It Now. The seller called the color Amethyst!

A mint dish with shell-shaped top in Amber sold for \$225.

A cocktail with Crown Tuscan stem and Royal Blue bowl sold for \$315, while one with a Carmen bowl sold for \$820.



#### Imperial Hunt Etching

A set of 3 4-1/4 inch #3051 tumblers in Light Emerald Green with gold encrusted etching sold for \$75 Buy It Now.



A #103 dome-lidded candy with plume finial in Ebony with gold encrusted etching sold for the \$250 opening bid.

A #623 5-piece highball set in Amber with gold encrusted etching sold for \$113.



A #3075/6 80 ounce covered jug in Light Emerald Green with gold encrusted etching sold for the \$150 opening bid. A #3075/5 80 ounce jug (no lid) in PeachBlo with gold encrusted etching sold



for \$207.

A lovely #880/8701 5-piece bridge set in Willow Blue with gold encrusted etching sold for the opening bid of \$200. The blown tumblers had a fine rib optic, and



the tumbler tray had the impressed suits of cards symbols. I'm surprised it didn't go higher.

#### Rose Point etching

A #3400/65 14 inch chop plate in Amber (no gold encrustation in the etching) sold for \$77.

A pair of #1604 hurricane lamps sold for \$178. The seller noted some chips on the bottom of the chimneys.

A #3400/141 80 ounce jug with modified handle and the earlier style long spout, the etching gold encrusted, sold for \$235 Buy It Now.



#### Gold, Silver and Enamel Decorations



A #3075 22 ounce pitcher in Amethyst with crystal handle and lid, the body etched and platinum encrusted Gloria, sold for \$185 Buy It Now. This is part of the #489 boudoir set. The lid has the fancy life saver shaped finial.

A #3400/100 76 ounce ice lip jug in Royal Blue with DePasse Pearsall swans silver deposit decoration sold for \$250 in an incognito Buy It Now listing. An identical jug sold for \$875 in July 2021, properly attributed both as to maker and decorator.



A pair of #3500/45 10 inch flared urn vases in Ebony with gold encrusted Blossom Time etching sold for \$271 in an incognito auction listing.



A #1 Everglade 10 inch bowl (or was it the #1207 11 inch bowl?) in Moonlight Blue sold for \$51. A tiny chip on one foot was noted.

A pair of #3797 Square 5-1/2 inch tumblers with Smoke bowl sold for \$38 Buy It Now. The same seller also offered a set of 4 #3797 Square 4 inch tumblers with Smoke bowl, which sold for \$70 Buy It Now. Nice tumblers, but they were missing the "Cambridge by Imperial" sticker.



A Tally Ho punch ladle dipped out for \$86.

A set of 3 #7606



1-1/2 ounce optic whiskeys with medium sham bottoms, etched Marjorie, sold for the \$100 opening bid.

A Nearcut Marjorie pattern syrup sold for \$125. The seller stated that the Rogers silver top was sterling, but gauging by the photographs, it was almost assuredly silver plated.





Okay, WHEN was the last time you saw someone offer a set of 10 (ten!) #3400/144 footed ashtray/place card holders with Carmen tops? Never, right? Me neither. They sold for \$125, for a per-piece price of \$12.50.

What a steal. And what an impressive tabletop they will set!

One seller offered what they called a #745 Springtime 12-1/2 inch bowl in Moonlight Blue, which sold for \$125 Buy It Now. This is the console bowl with flat rim



and impressed floral pattern that is usually found with satin highlights in the pattern. However, my friends, that was NOT Moonlight Blue; it was BLUEBELL. I don't remember ever seeing one of these in THAT color before! Accordingly, I hereby bestow upon the savvy buyer of this piece the Michael Krumme Connoisseur's Choice Award.

A #11089-1/2 inch Mandolin Lady figural flower holder in Light Emerald Green was offered for \$250, but sold for an undisclosed Best Offer. She seemed to be leaning forward, with her head turned; I'm not sure if the piece sagged, or if this was intentional.



A pair of #1268 keyhole style 2-lite candelabra in Moonlight Blue with matching Moonlight Blue bobeches sold for \$395 Buy It Now. The seller noted that some of the prisms were not

original, but they looked pretty close to me.

A set of 6 Varitone Harlequin rainbow 3104 tall stems sold for \$476. The photograph wasn't great, but a Cambridge

"helper" surmised that there were 2 in either Mocha or Light Amber, 2 in Topaz, 1 in Pistachio, and 1 in Forest Green. I'm not sure I would have recognized these, had I encountered them in real life.



A pair of Caprice #69 7-1/2 inch version 3 "two holder" candlesticks in Moonlight Blue with one short spear prism at each end below the candle socket sold for \$485. This was the style that had the teardrop type design that filled in the shoulder. A later remake had a deep notch where that motif was in the mold. And of course, the very first version had two seashell feet! I'm sure the new owner gave them a Windex shower and a good scrubdown, because they needed it. Why can't some sellers WASH their glass?

A set of 10 #1955 6 ounce old fashioned tumblers in Sunset sold for \$490, after being discounted from the initial \$700 price.



#### Corrections to Last Month's Report

Last month I reported on a comport with shell top "in solid Forest Green." A loyal reader corrected me; the proper color name is Late Dark Emerald. This piece is also known in solid Moonlight Blue and solid Mandarin Gold.



I also reported on two Canape Sets identified as Cambridge #693/3000, one with a gold encrusted Rooster etching, and one with a hunt scene encrusted with red enamel and gold trim (not "the" Hunt etching.)

I said that I wasn't convinced that either set was Cambridge, but one reader advised me that both etchings are shown on the Miami Valley Study Group's website and identified as Cambridge. However, another reader stated, "The administrators of the Fry Glass group on Facebook believe that both etchings are Fry. Though the Fry company production records are incomplete, apparently there are shards in the Fry dump with etchings that match these." They attached a screen shot of a hunt scene canapé set that matches the one in last month's report. Personally, I believe that the shape of the tumblers in these two sets does not match the shape of the Cambridge cocktail tumbler, which I believe is slightly narrower and not as wide at the top.

That's it for now. 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
