#### Mini-Auction at Convention Benefits the Endowment Fund

An endowment is a donation of money or property to a nonprofit organization that uses the resulting investment income for a specific purpose. Most endowments are designed to keep the principal amount intact while using the investment income for charitable efforts.

What is the Cambridge Endowment Fund? Established in 1997, the Endowment Fund is the cornerstone of NCC's long-range planning. The fund's unrestricted principal generates income, which provides the organization with continued revenues. The goal is to maintain and ultimately grow the principal to provide sufficient revenues to guarantee the preservation mission, especially the National Museum of Cambridge Glass.

How does the Endowment Fund grow? Since NCC is not currently withdrawing from the Endowment Fund, any generated income is reinvested back into the fund. The fund also grows when the board of directors reviews the financial status and decides to transfer from the operating fund to the Endowment Fund. Yet another way the fund grows is through your contributions that are designated for the Endowment Fund. And of course, activities such as the 50-50 raffle held at the March auction, and this mini-auction generate proceeds that are directed to the Endowment Fund.

Volunteering to donate a piece of glass to the miniauction to be held during the Friday night banquet is another way you can support the convention and help to promote our excellent museum. The endowment committee is requesting members' consideration in donating a quality Cambridge glass piece with a market value of approximately \$50 or greater for the mini-auction. # 2023 NCC Convention: A Golden Celebration

50 Years is a Reason to Celebrate at the Convention!

In 1973, I was eight years old. My primary studies had me understand that pioneers were European and African American people and other emigrants who had migrated west in Conestoga wagons to embark on new lives and adventures. The museum also includes a Dining Room, Sample Room, and Member's display area that is changed annually, as well as an interpretive area demonstrating how glass was made from gathering, shaping, etching, and engraving. This year, the museum features glass from Cambridge Glass Company Restaurant. The museum also has a beautiful gift shop where many pieces of Cambridge glass are for sale. It is important to note that this museum replaces the original National Museum of Cambridge Glass, which had been built years earlier by the efforts of NCC members but was severely damaged by floods in 1998.

Lastly, renew friendships and make new acquaintances during the convention cocktail hours and meals. Fellowship is the heart of the National Cambridge Collectors organization. Exchange a story, discuss your collection, and make a toast to another 50 years!

#### A Look Back In Time

The very first organizational meeting of NCC took place on March 5, 1973, at the Cambridge Savings & Loan in Cambridge, Ohio. The following are the original minutes of that meeting as recorded by Dick Pavlov, Secretary. It identifies the first board of directors and their terms, as well as the officers. These minutes were typed, and I have tried to recreate them exactly as they appeared. It provides some interesting insight into the formation of NCC. A couple of observations. Apparently, Leanna Thompson was initially

supposed to be a board member, but she was not present, and Gary Campbell was elected instead. The board enacted a rule requiring they wait at least two weeks before being able to buy things from the Crystal Ball. Remember in those days, there was no internet. In addition to antique shows, etc., publications were a major source of information and buying opportunities. They didn't want there to be a perception of impropriety. Enjoy!

ORGANIZATIONAL MEETING - March 5, 1973 - 6:30 PM - Cambridge Sav. & Loan
Present were the proposed 12-member Board of directors of the National Cambridge
Collectors, Inc.; consisting of Charles
Upton, Ruth Forsythe, Dick Pavlov, John
Wolfe, Evelyn Allen, Harry Allen, Loraine
Yeakley, Jabe Tarter, Dale Snode, Ed Ruby,
Bob Coyle and Leanna Thompson (not present).

In opening the meeting, Charles Upton suggested that anyone present who objected to the selection of a 12-member Board of Directors, in preference to an open meeting, should make their objections known at this time. Upton stated that total co-operation and harmony were of vital importance to the club. Mr. Lyle Welker felt the meeting should have been an open meeting and not of a group chosen by Upton and Wolfe. Mr. Welker then departed.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS: Ruth Forsythe made the motion that Charles Upton serve as President (Seconded by Evelyn Allen - Motion voted and carried.) Bob Coyle motioned Ruth Forsythe for Vice President (Dale Snode seconded - Motion voted and carried). Ruth Forsythe motioned John Wolfe to serve as treasurer (Jabe Tarter seconded - Motion voted and carried). Dale Snode motioned Dick Pavlov to serve as Secretary (John Wolfe seconded - Motion voted and carried).

After discussion concerning officers elected, it was decided their terms would end with the first annual meeting in May 1974.

Officers were elected as follows - PRESIDENT - Charles Upton; VICE PRESIDENT - Ruth Forsythe; SECRETARY - Dick Pavlov; TREASURER - John Wolfe

Evelyn Allen motioned (seconded by Ruth Forsythe) that the following people serve

as the Board of Directors for the following period of times. Motion voted and approved as follows:

The CONSTITUTION and BY-LAWS were discussed. In article 7; section 1: item E - the word "entered" was omitted and the word "Present" was added. Dick Pavlov motioned that the word "Organization" in Article 6; section 6 be omitted. John Wolfe seconded and the motion was carried. Ruth Forsythe motioned the by-laws of the Constitution be accepted (seconded by Jabe Tarter). After further discussion, it was decided that other changes might be necessary upon Attorney Russel Booth's advice. Dale Snode made a motion that a committee of four officers meet with Russell Booth to revise the Constitution. Jabe Tarter seconded - motion carried.

Ed Ruby made the motion for dues to be \$10.00 for a voting member and \$3.00 for each non-voting household member - Seconded by Harry Allen - Motion carried.

A motion was made by Jabe Tarter and seconded by Evelyn Allen, which restricts Board members from making purchases from the newsletter for a two week period after its publication. Motion carried.

Jabe Tarter made the motion to adjourn (seconded by John Wolfe - Motion carried).

## **Zoom & Tell: Silver Overlay**

Guests joining the much-anticipated April Zoom & Tell program on silver overlay were not disappointed. Les Hansen opened the program with an introduction on the chemistry behind the silver overlay process. To apply a silver decoration to glass, a flux was initially applied and baked onto the glass at a low temperature. Then, the glass was placed into a liquid solution

containing silver. An electrical current was applied to the flux on a piece of glass causing the silver to collect. No documentation exists stating that Cambridge applied silver overlay designs to glass using this process. Nevertheless, etchings from the 1920-30's are found with a silver-like encrusting. No one knows for certain whether the silver-colored substance is silver, white gold or platinum. (The following is the author's opinion.) I do know the silver-like substance applied to etchings does tarnish, so there is a strong possibility Cambridge created an encrusting material made of silver much like they did for yellow gold. Unlike gold, silver will tarnish. Because the application is only an encrusting and not an overlay, the polishing process will remove the silver decoration. Cambridge produced the silver encrusted pieces for a relatively short period of time and they may have been discontinued due to customer complaints of tarnishing and the inability to clean without damaging the decoration. Since gold does not tarnish, customers would not encounter the same problems with gold encrusted pieces.

Several silver companies purchased and decorated Cambridge glass. The five major silver decorating companies were Rockwell (Meriden, CT), Silver City (Meriden, CT), DePasse Pearsall (New York, NY), National Silver Deposit (New York, NY) and Lotus (Barnesville, OH). Of the five companies, collectors feel the Rockwell designs are the highest quality. Most silver decorations are two dimensional, but some Rockwell decorations have additional details that give the designs a three-dimensional appearance. The silver seahorse or dragon applied to pieces of Crown Tuscan are highly prized by collectors. The Swan and Peacock decoration by DePasse Pearsall are equally popular. Most of the silver overlay decorations on Caprice were done by

Silver City. Silver decorating companies including Rockwell, DePasse Pearsall, Lotus and National Silver Deposit preferred to apply their decorations to Ebony, Royal Blue, Carmen, Amethyst and Amber colored glass. Nevertheless, silver decorations were applied to almost every color of glass produced during the 1920-30's.

Zoom & Tell guests shared their prized pieces of Cambridge glass having various silver overlay decorations during the April program. Many of the pieces attached to this article were shared during the April program. The June Zoom & Tell program will be held on Tuesday, June 13 at 8:00 EST. The theme for the June program is Cambridge Swans. I hope you will join. If no color is mentioned, assume that the piece or part of it being discussed is crystal. If I refer to an auction as "incognito," that means that the seller did not know he or she was offering Cambridge glass, and didn't use the word "Cambridge" in the description. I also mention if a listing was a Buy It Now offering, as opposed to an auction style listing. I think it's important to distinguish between the two, as the price for an auctioned item reflects competitive bidding (or no competition, if it sells for the opening bid.) Here we go:

#### Statuesque (Nude Stem) and Related Items

A 9 inch table goblet with Carmen bowl and satinized stem and foot sold for \$200 Buy It Now.



A flared comport with Forest Green bowl sold for \$120 Buy It Now.

A set of 6 cocktails with Carmen bowls sold for the opening bid of \$226.

A set of 3 cocktails with Amethyst bowls and Crown Tuscan stems and feet sold for \$360 Buy It Now.

#### **Etched Tableware and Stemware**

A #94 sweet pea vase in Amber etched Rosalie sold for a too-low \$29.





A 3400/71 4-toed nut dish in Light Emerald Green etched Gloria sold for \$44.

A #402 12 inch vase with a Tulip etching sold for \$110 Buy It Now. I have it on good authority that this tulip etching was



done by Lotus Glass Company, and that it has been seen on blanks manufactured by Cambridge and Central Glass Works.

A #1090 Decagon 7 inch comport in Light Emerald Green etched Lorna sold for \$60.

#### Rose Point

A set of 4 liquor cocktails with Amber bowls and pressed Rose Point stem was offered for \$130 and sold for an undisclosed Best Offer.



A #477 9-1/2 inch corn dish with gold encrusted etching sold for \$125 Buy It Now.

A#1066 ivy ball vase etched Rose Point sold for the opening bid of \$150. That seems to be the going price for this item. One month I reported on two selling during my reporting period, for about that number.



A set of  $10 \#3400/115 \ 13$  ounce tumblers sold for \$210 Buy It Now.

#### Gold, Silver and Enamel Decorations

A#1300 vase in Crown Tuscan with D/1048 gold encrusted Candlelight etching sold for \$85 Buy It Now. Though the seller provided precise line numbers and a good description, there was no mention of the piece's height.





A 5 piece cocktail set consisting of a #623 center-handled tray and 4 #3051 footed tumblers in PeachBlo with gold encrusted Hunt scene etching sold for \$140 Buy It Now.



A #278 11 inch footed vase in Amber with gold encrusted Portia etching sold for \$225 Buy It Now.

A #3400/44 4-toed bowl in Amethyst with Japonica enamel

decoration sold for the opening bid of \$1,500. A chip on one foot was noted.



#### Miscellaneous

A set of 4 #1 muddlers in Royal Blue sold for \$46 Buy It Now.



I must be a bona fide glass geek, because sometimes I get more

excited about unusual things than I do the big showy items. A pair of #1073 Decagon 8-1/4 inch "plate[s] with seat" (described as such in the price guide to the 1927-1929 catalog reprints, where they are shown on page 41) in PeachBlo sold for \$50 Buy It Now. The seller charmingly described them as "borderline rare." The catalog shows this plate with a #3077 10 ounce footed tumbler.

A #898 set in Light Emerald Green asparagus platter with sauce boat (and also including a sauce ladle) sold for \$109 Buy It Now.



A "wide" style samovar in satin finish Bluebell sold for the opening bid of \$120. One handle was detached at the bottom and needed to be reattached by a silver repair person.



A #1 Keg Set with the barrel and whiskies in PeachBlo sold for the \$195 opening bid. Always nice to see these sets, it's just missing the #213 tray.

A rare Caprice #52 1/4 pound butter dish sold for \$220 Buy It Now. I hadn't seen one of these go off in a while.





I don't get to report on many unusual pieces of Cambridge carnival glass, so it was nice to see a 2699/215 Buzz Saw 9 inch jug with carnival treatment on 1916 Emerald. It was offered for \$225 but sold for an undisclosed Best Offer.

A rare Mardi Gras 13 inch vase was offered for \$295 but sold for an undisclosed best offer. It sported an original label.



A 13 inch swan in Ebony, chip on foot and top edge, some water staining, was offered for \$350 but sold for an undisclosed best offer.

A pair of Mt. Vernon dolphin candlesticks in Bluebell was offered for \$300 but sold for an undisclosed best offer.





A Caprice #112 twin salad dressing with center handle and two ladles, all in Moonlight Blue, was offered for \$350 but sold for an undisclosed best offer.

An Amber cocktail shaker in Farber Bros. chrome was offered for \$465 but sold for an undisclosed best offer. It had some issues with the chrome and a rim chip. The asking price seemed quite high to me; what am I missing here? Is it the piece, the color, or?

#### Corrections and Reader Comments

Regarding the #616 cigarette box with Elaine etching I reported on last month, a reader commented, "The box is actually the #615, not the larger #616. I have never seen the #616 in Elaine, and it probably doesn't exist... but you never know."
