PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The Auction is Coming

The auction team with help from volunteers, selected, identified, photographed, and cataloged 410 lots for the March Auction. Many beautiful pieces of Cambridge glass are being offered for sale, and I anticipate fierce bidding on several items. Pictures are good, but seeing all that sparkling glass on display is a sight you need to experience in person.

This year's auction has items to tempt every collector. You'll find pieces with gold encrusted etching, gold trimmed, enamel decorated, and Charleton decorated. If you are a cordial collector, you have some nice ones to select from. And of course, the selection of colors available is outstanding.

It is always impressive to see some rare or unusual items in the auction, even if they don't make it into your collection. The word "rare" appears five times in the auction listing. Look at lot 158, controlled bubble vase in Moonlight Blue. Lot 159, a Caprice bowl with silver and enamel decoration. I'll let you seek out the other three items. What about unusual? Among the six items, you should look at lot 164, a 3500 Mocha cordial. Also look at lot 235, a 12 oz Amber Apple Blossom with sham bottom. You can continue to search by keywords like rare or unusual, or just look at everything. Make sure to look at the early Nearcut items. Browse through the auction listing and pictures and make your own selections.

If you are unable to attend the March auction in person, make sure to submit your absentee bids as described in the January issue.

Social Media

How does NCC engage with collectors on social media? FacebookTM is the most popular site. If you use other social media, let us know. Cindy Arent shares information about the latest happenings at the museum. Over 3,900 people "like" and follow the museum Facebook page.

Obviously, Cindy is engaging with a lot of interested people, but who are not members of NCC. David Ray works on the member focused Facebook page and shares information such as "Cambridge 101" and explains basic glass concepts. He has over 2,300 followers. It would be great if we could capture some of those followers to join us and be a *Friend of Cambridge*.

NCC relies on dedicated volunteers to get most of its work done. We can always use new volunteers to become involved and relieve existing volunteers. Your Board of Directors has been discussing the need for a Governance Committee. This committee will review our existing Constitution (last updated June 2012), By-Laws (last updated June 2021) and Policy Book (last updated January 2021) and recommend updates. Are you interested serving on this committee?

At the January board meeting, the 2023 financial report and the 2024 budget were approved. The March Crystal Ball will include a summary. You can also view the detailed reports on our website.

What's coming?

I will be attending two glass shows in February and will have information about NCC. It is also an opportunity to talk with interested individuals and explain the benefits of supporting NCC. Let me know if you need information to share with places that you visit.

As soon as these tasks were completed, the reorganizing of supplies, and tearing down extra boxes, etc. began. The annual cleaning of the Museum began with cleaning walls and woodwork and then we were ready to start cleaning glass and polishing silver overlay. This year we started with the Near Cut cases and moved chronologically through the glass display area.

The Ohio Lions Club held their annual retreat at Salt Fork Lodge on January 13th. Lindy Thaxton and I were asked to do a presentation during one of the Saturday morning sessions. People who attended our program about Cambridge Glass, and the handmade glassmaking process, enjoyed every minute of the program and asked many questions. Minutes of the October 21, 2023 Fall Meeting

President Freeman Moore called the meeting to order at 6:35 pm, with about 45 members in attendance. The meeting was held in the upper level of Theo's Restaurant in Cambridge Ohio and also on Zoom.

Secretary's Report:

Stuart Sandler is the Board Secretary and is not available tonight. Christine Smith was the Secretary in June, and produced the minutes of the June Annual Meeting that were published in the September Crystal Ball. Larry Everett moved to accept the minutes as printed, second by Frank Wollenhaupt. Motion passed.

Treasurer's Report:

Mike Strebler is the Board Treasurer and provided highlights of NCC financial situation. NCC is doing well and spending is in line with the approved budget. The Annual Fund is NCC's primary donor campaign, and the members have responded well. The Endowment Fund reached a milestone this year of exceeding \$1M, but has retreated slightly due to market situations. Minor fluctuations are acceptable since we're looking for long term growth to support NCC in the future.

Operational Vice-President's reports:

Administration: Larry Everett thanked our Business Manager Lisa Nielson for all the work she does to keep the business side of NCC operating. Larry also reported the museum has a three lease on a new credit-card machine, and worked to removed a monthly insurance damage fee.

Development: Julie Buffenbarger was in Cambridge earlier in the afternoon helping to process auction consignments. Nothing else to report.

Education: Jack Thompson thanked everyone for attending tonight. The Fall 2024 meeting should be the 3rd Saturday, and he'll confirm the reservation.

Member Services: Freeman Moore reported we have 674 members, down slightly from the 686 at this time last year. The initial Annual Fund mailing that goes to all members was sent in mid-April. A reminder to sent to 100 households in last July. Next week, a 3rd reminder will be sent. Freeman thanked Elaine Thompson for

chairing the membership committee.

Museum: Cindy Arent reported the museum has been busy with visitors and tours. They have been busy setting up eight window displays on Main St to support the Dickens Holiday activities. The museum started with 150 ornaments made from your donations of damaged stemware. Once pictures were posted on Facebook, orders came in quickly with packing and shipping following. Thanks to Frank Wollenhaupt for bringing a box of materials to support the ornament sales.

New Business:

Freeman Moore announced that the Nominating Committee will start to solicit candidates for next year's Board of Directors election. Contact Elaine Thompson if you are interested in helping. The slate will be presented at the March meeting.

Upon hearing no further new business, Scott Adams moved to adjourn the meeting, second by Frank Wollenhaupt. The meeting adjourned, to be followed by Show and Tell conducted by Lynn Welker, and the educational program, Rock Crystal Engravings, by Mike Strebler and Jack Thompson.

The December Zoom & Tell program focused on items with lids, but excluded candy boxes and candy containers. The topic of "candies" will be a future Zoom & Tell topic.

Jack Thompson opened the program by showing guests several Cambridge items that were sold with lids. Most of the time, Cambridge referred to items as having a cover, not a lid. Some of the items having covers produced by Cambridge include jugs, urns, temple jars, swans, marmalades, mustards, butters, honey boxes, sweetmeats, syrups, cigarette boxes, humidors, turkeys, pretzel jars, cookie jars, cracker jars, puff boxes, pomades, etc.

Most covers are made of glass, but some items possess a metal lid Cambridge purchased from another company. Some syrups, salt and pepper shakers and cocktail shakers were sold with metal lids. Guests attending the Zoom & Tell shared many beautiful examples from their collections. Each month, I continue to be amazed at the variety of examples collectors have acquired as part of their collections. The February Zoom & Tell program will be led by Jonathan Fuhrman, and focus on comports and compotes. I have always wondered what the difference was between a comport and a compote. Hopefully Jonathan's program will help answer that question. The February Zoom & Tell program will be held on Tuesday, February 13 at 8:00 PM EST.

Welcome to the eBay Report, featuring Cambridge glass items that sold on eBay over the past month. Selling prices are rounded to the nearest dollar. If no color is mentioned, assume that the piece or part of it being discussed is crystal. If I refer to an auction as "incognito," that means that the seller did not know he or she was offering Cambridge glass, and didn't use the word "Cambridge" in the description. I also mention if a listing was a Buy It Now offering, as opposed to an auction style listing. I think it's important to distinguish between the two, as the price for an auctioned item reflects competitive bidding (or no competition, if it sells for the opening bid.) Here we go:

Let's start with the some exciting items:

A very rare Carmen Japonica 3400/9 7" 4 footed covered candy dish; inside satin finish, marked on bottom with triangle logo sold for Buy-It-Now \$3950.



A Rare Cambridge Caprice Moonlight Blue 9 1/2" #609 Salad Spoon was listed at 125.00 and sold for

\$100.00. Where is the matching fork?

Four rare 500/1630 Block Optic 5" tumblers in Rubina, sold for \$393.00 with 18 bids.



A rare pitcher and eight matching glasses in

Pink; etched Classic, sold for \$899.00. I could not locate a line number for the unusual shaped pitcher and tumblers.



Rose Point:

A #119 basket, 11 1/2" tall, with a squared handle sold for \$210.00.

A flat vase, #1242; 10 ¹/₂" tall sold for \$185.00.

A large footed Vase, #1299, 11" excellent condition noted, sold for \$209.00

Etches:



A beautiful 3400/38 Gloria Royal Blue ball pitcher with clear handle sold for \$595.00.

A rare 3400/38 Carmen etched Portia ball pitcher, gold encrusted, sold for \$4306.00 with 15 bids. The same dealer had 4 rare Carmen etched

Portia tumblers, gold encrusted, were listed at \$2000 and sold at an Undisclosed Best Offer. Some gold loss was noted.





Eight Wildflower 3.5" Coasters were listed at \$139.95 and sold for an undisclosed best offer.

A #532 Light Emerald Early Wildflower etched 6" tall by 6 ³/₄" wide compote, or sweets stand, sold for \$97.50.

An Everglade #20 Lily Vase in Willow Blue,10.5" tall, sold for \$690.00.





A 3011/40 Windsor Blue Seashell flying lady bowl sold for \$599.00. It was listed in the ad as Moonlight Blue.



Three Boyd dealer signs; a flat diamond shape paperweight; a standing diamond sign, and a Cambridge triangle in Vaseline sold for \$307.00 with 33 bids. Since it was listed as "vaseline", the seller provided black-light pictures as well. The Cambridge triangle has the "knock off" base, which is how it comes out of the mould.



Four Blue Willow enamel 10 1/2" clear dinner plates noted in good condition sold for \$160.00.



A Everglade #23 5" globe vase in Violet, was listed for \$400.00 and sold for an Undisclosed Best Offer. It was listed as "Rare Antique Cambridge Glass Purple Heliotrope Bowl Lavender Helio 5"x 5".




Apair of Rubina Candlesticks; 8 1/4" tall, were listed at \$225.00 and sold at an Undisclosed Best Offer.

Member Spotlight: Sharon Miller



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
